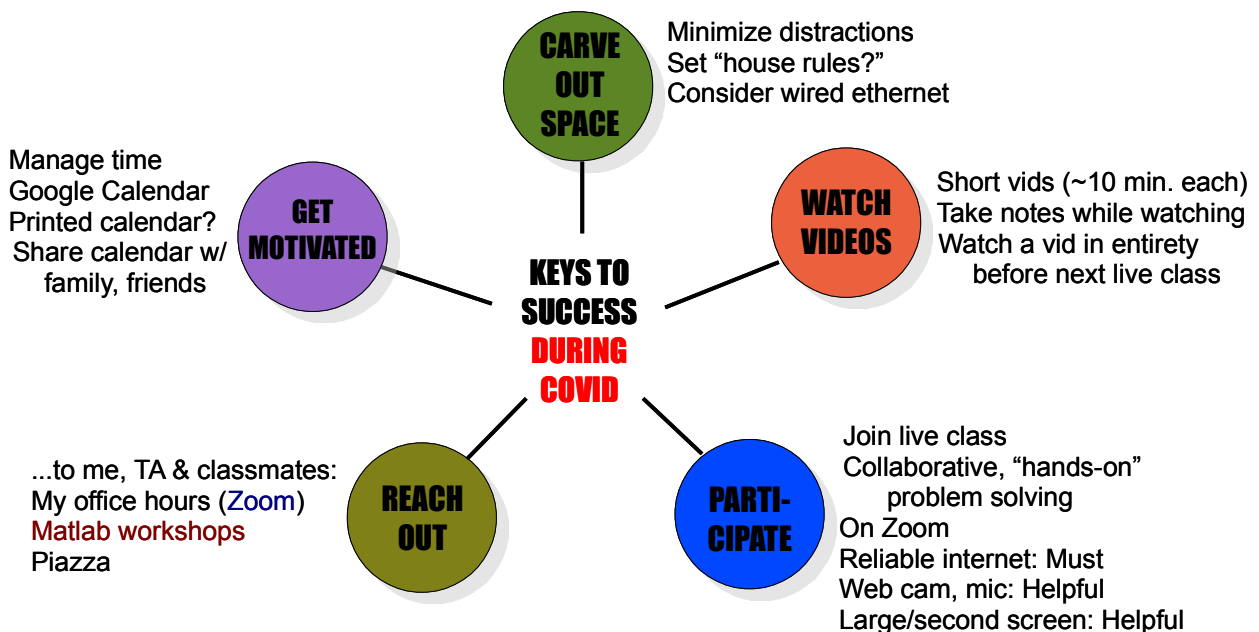
Prerequisites: CS 109 (or similar), ME 210, MATH 220

Course Description: Learn how to analyze anything that vibrates.

Course Objectives: 1. Review and reinforce your understanding of dynamics (Newton's 2nd law), FBD, and 1st-order ODE, 2. Understand basic theories that govern vibrations, and 3. Be able to apply these theories in real-world situations

I will do my best to impart knowledge and provide guidance along the way, and ultimately it is up to you how much you want to accomplish.

Vibrations

FPs (Fluency Points) can be earned by demonstrating *fluency* in the following five categories of tasks. None of the tasks are mandatory. Instead, it's up to you to pick and choose, mix and match, and take on any number of tasks as you wish! The fluency scale above is designed to give you flexibility, and the ability to customize your learning according to how much you want to achieve (or what final grade you aim for).

The task categories are:

- Video lecture notes = 1 FP each (34 max)
- Nano quizzes = 1 FP each (7 max)
- Syllabus quiz = 1 FP
- Projects = FP varies
- Others = FP varies

Most tasks (projects, nano quizzes, video notes, etc.) will be released, collected (uploaded by you), and graded on [Gradescope](#).

“Half-Life” Late Submissions

All tasks have a due date. See class homepage's “Calendar Central” for a detailed schedule. Projects are due on Fridays, nano quizzes Mondays, video notes just before start time of the next live class on MWF. Unless accommodated, all work submitted past the due date cutoff will be subject to a reduction in FP based on the half-

life formula: $FP_A = FP_O \cdot \left(\frac{1}{2}\right)^t$, where FP_A is the actual FP awarded, FP_O the original FP, and t the elapsed time

past the due date cutoff, measured in days. Any lateness, down to the seconds, will be rounded *up* to the next number of days (e.g., 4 minutes late = 1 day; 29 hours late = 2 days; etc.).

- Use good grammar and spelling in written communications.
- In emails, always identify yourself and what class and section you are in. It is a good practice to put your course and section in the subject line. This helps your instructor identify course related emails.
